



Say No (again) to an environmentally destroying boardwalk through the South Trigg Beach Class A Reserve 46248 Bush Forever Area 308 Sector 6 Trigg Bushland Reserve

- The South Trigg Beach “A” Class Reserve and a Bush Forever Area 308 containing a Threatened Ecological Community of Rottnest Pines situated within a Quindalup dune system of State wide significance.
- This is the only coastal reserve with a Class A classification in the City of Stirling – the highest conservation protection available – for a reason.
- The 13.37ha of remnant vegetated Quindalup coastal dunes is Sector 6 of the Trigg Bushland Reserve and forms a natural sequence from the foreshore to the adjacent bushland for 2 kms to Karrinyup marri and tuart woodlands and east to Lynn St Trigg.
- A 2m wide boardwalk over 1km long and associated infrastructure would require access for construction, on-going maintenance and emergency vehicles, lighting for safety, introduce rubbish, weeds and uncontrolled public access to the fragile sand dunes.
- The Stirling Council has rejected plans for a boardwalk through the South Trigg Beach Reserve in 2005 and 2012 and a report was presented in 2022. Why is the City allocating \$500,000 of ratepayers money to do another “feasibility study” in 2024?
- Safety can be improved for pedestrians by upgrading and modifying the existing dual path – the City should do a feasibility study on this **now**.
