

MEET YOUR CANDIDATES



1. PEOPLE

- Know who you are meeting with THE CANDIDATE!
 - Learn about the candidates (not just the political party)
 - Find out what they care about and prioritise you can do this by asking why they nominated.
 - Ask them and confirm this when you meet

Ensure the candidate knows who they are meeting with – YOU!

- Share your personal story
- For example
 - a) Who you are
 - b)How long lived in electorate
 - c) Connections you have in the electorate
 - d) Where you live in electorate
 - e) Your experience with engaging the Members of Parliament (good/bad feel represented?)









MEET YOUR CANDIDATES



2. ABOUT THE PATCH/YOUR PASSION/LOCAL MATTER

- Ask the candidate to share their current understanding first LISTEN
 - About the patch, their personal position, party affiliation position and commitments
 - Note: The candidate likely is not an expert, aware or may not have prioritised the matter
- Reflect to the candidate what you heard the candidate understands –
 REFLECT
 - Gives the candidate an opportunity to clarify
- Share why you care about this patch of bushland/nature SHARE
 - Express your topline thoughts, knowledge and understanding of the patch/matter
 - Express, if possible, how this connects to the WA State Election Environment Priorities










MEET YOUR CANDIDATES



3. CANDIDATES COMMITMENT AND FOLLOW UP

- Bring along the Nature Priorities Scorecard and use as a guide
- Connect your patch to the priority needs for better nature protection in WA
- Seek a commitment from candidate and use scorecard to capture responses
- Complete the form. Follow up with candidate






7 PRIORITY NATURE ASKS









Ask Your State Election Candidates If They Will...

- Deliver new, strong **Black Cockatoo Recovery Plans**, to save all three threatened Black Cockatoo species in WA from extinction
- 2 Update the **Biodiversity Strategy for WA** to protect and restore WA's ecosystems
- Place a moratorium on clearing critical habitat and remnant native vegetation in WA
- 4 Fund **ecological restoration programs** to increase native vegetation cover to 30% by 2040, focusing on local government areas and
- bioregions with less than 10% cover

 Support the WA Environmental Protection Authority to assess the
- Support the WA Environmental Protection Authority to assess th state of the Swan Coastal Plain bioregion
- 6 Limit the use of environmental offsets in WA and establish stringent criteria to guarantee that offsets contribute to an absolute gain in habitat and biodiversity
- 7 Improve government consultation standards to ensure meaningful and ongoing public participation in environmental decision-making

BIG, BIG CHANGE TO WA's LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL



The LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL = CRITICAL CHAMBER

- Reviews legislation passed by the lower house
- Monitors, scrutinises & reviews govt administration & expenditure
- Represents the people of WA, matters of public interest to be heard & brought to public attention (eg our petitions).



2021-2025 CHAMBER

OUT with the OLD: 6 'community of interest' regions (3 regional, 3 metro e.g Agriculture, South Metro). We were represented by 6 members/region. Total 36 seats.

IN with the NEW: 2021 legislation passed to abolish regions & increase size to 37 seats. All elected by the state-at-large (similar to Federal Senate).

 Combines the proportional & preferential voting system of the single transferable vote.









NEW VOTING OPTIONS for LEGISLATIVE COUNCIL



The ballot paper or 'bedspread' is 14 columns wide and almost 40 rows deep.

YOU CAN vote:

either ABOVE the line = Numbering 1 or more squares (WAEC will then follow the <u>registered voting cards of the groups</u>, in the order of your voting preference)

or BELOW the line = Numbering up to 20 or more squares (WAEC will then follow your vote preference)

Be careful NOT to MARK/NUMBER both sides of the THICK BLACK LINE.

Otherwise, your vote will be considered informal / invalid.





